## FROM THE HEADTEACHER

Happy New Year to you all. I hope the Christmas break was a wonderful family time and restorative. The staff joins me in thanking you for your cards and gifts; we were really overwhelmed by your generosity.

School was a busy place during the break: some spaces on the middle site had new carpet and lights, the dead tree at risk of toppling over was cut down. Heating on the junior site was fixed once again - fingers crossed it stays warm for the rest of winter.

You will have seen lots in the news in recent weeks about the rise in infections resulting in a strain on the NHS in what has been described as the toughest winter it's dealt with. Professor Susan Hopkins, chief medical officer at the UK Health Security Agency, has recommended that simple precautions are taken to minimise the spread in school settings. Included in those, and in line with St Mary's policy, children with a fever or those who are presenting as unwell should not be brought to school. Staff at school who are simply feeling under the weather but are not unwell have been asked to wear a face covering; you may see this when you are at school; please don't be alarmed. We really are trying to keep the school fully staffed and open this winter.

## **Outdoor Learning**

In the coming weeks we will be announcing the order in which children across years 1 to 6 will attend our new provision (details for Reception children to follow later in the year). We are aiming to implement a plan that allows us to schedule 2 x 4-week sessions per class, per year. Your child's Tucasi account has been set up to show Outdoor Learning at a cost £20. However, it will allow you to pay in stages if that suits you best. You can also overpay if you wish to cover the second lot of

sessions in advance. Those children in receipt of the Pupil Premium Grant will be paid for.
