Using inverted commas for direct speech

Inverted commas must go around what is being said.

"I'm walking to school!" shouted Emma.

Charlie asked, "Where are we going next?"

• Using conjunctions (when, because, after, before), time conjunctions (then, next, soon) and prepositions (in outside, under) to extend sentences

Using fronted adverbials to give more detail about when (time), where (place)
or how (manner) something happened.

At sunset, Sam crawled towards the exit.

In the park, a lonely figure sat on the bench.

Without a sound, the girl crept up the stairs.

Using the present perfect tense

Present perfect tense is used for when things that have happened in the past are true now or have an effect on what is happening now. 'Andrew <u>has lived</u> in this town for 5 years' 'We <u>have been</u> best friends for 10 years.'
