Please find below details of our learning for the half term ahead.

Current or A	Key question: Were the Anglo Saxons good for Britain?
Summer 1	<u>Great work:</u> We will be creating our own still life drawings based on Leonardo Da Vinci's, 'study

Maths	In maths, we will continue our learning on decimals. We will specifically look at:

	We will then move onto money, specifically looking at:

	Times tables will continue to be practised regularly
	Key Vocabulary: fractions, decimals, tenths, hundredths, partition, pounds, pence
English	In English, we will be exploring myths and legends, with a focus on Anglo-Saxon versions. The children will then create their own mythical character and will then write a story about good versus evil. We will use the text 'Beowulf' by Michael Morpurgo to support our writing. We will also devise our own biography about King Alfred the Great. <i>Key vocabulary: myth, inverted commas, fronted adverbials, expanded noun phrases with</i>
	prepositions, paragraphs, apostrophe for possession, contracted words
Religious	In RE this half term, the children will be looking at 'What does it mean to be Hindu?'
Education	There will be a focus on, what it means for a Hindu to live with a belief in dharma and karma?
Laudation	They will then learn about what it means to be born into a Hindu family as well as learning about
	weddings and funerals in the Hindu faith.
	Key Vocabulary: Agni: Sacred fire, Ahimsa: Complete non-violence, Ashrama: Stage in life
	Dharma: Dharma is a person's duty.
Science	In science, we will begin our unit on 'Living Things and Their Habitats'.
	We will be using classification keys for animals and plants, learning about human impacts on
	habitats and the different teeth that carnivores, herbivores and omnivores have and their purposes.
	We will also begin our learning on the digestive system and types of teeth.
Computing	Key vocabulary: Classification keys, living things, digestive system, tooth decay Repetition in games: This will be using the Scratch programme. Pupils look at the difference
Computing	between count-controlled and infinite loops, and use their knowledge to modify existing animations and games using repetition. Their final project is to design and create a game using repetition.
	Key Vocabulary: Scratch, programming, similarities and differences, modify
History	In history, we will study why the Anglo-Saxons invaded Britain, the impact they had, the key historical figures during this time period and how the Anglo-Saxons delivered justice. <i>Key Vocabulary: Anglo-Saxons, Picts, raids, Vikings, Dark Ages, bloodshed, chronology</i>
PE	Indoor - In dance, we will focus on creating characters and narrative through movement and
	gesture.
	Outdoor - In fitness, we will take part in a range of activities that explore and develop different
	areas of health and fitness. Pupils will be given opportunities to work at their maximum and
	improve their fitness levels.

Relationships	<b>Relationships and Sex Education: Healthy bodies, healthy minds:</b> We look at how we can keep our bodies and minds healthy and why this is important.

Art	In art, we will be looking at the 'study of hands' by Leonardo Da Vinci. We will continue to work on

Music	Starting on 26th April, Year 4 will learn brass instruments as part of their music curriculum. Two

	to play instruments in a whole class group and explore different elements of music through playing. For the end of this programme, you will be invited to a concert performance in the school
